

The T-Lizards blasted out of the gate with a 91-yard TD bomb to TY Hilton to spark a 1st half where they controlled the play and established a 20-7 lead. The Kings came back in the 3rd with TD passes of 47 and 15 yards from two different QBs, but a Carlos Hyde TD run put Durham back on top to start the 4th. LeGarrette Blount replied with a 10-yard TD run and 2 INTs led to 2 TDs in a 21-point 4th qt for the Kings.

D'Onta Foreman and Wendell Smallwood combined for 201 rushing yards and Jameis Winston passed for a TD and ran for another as the Swordfish dominated both sides of the ball to hand the Blue Eagles their 2nd straight loss. The teams traded TDs before the Fish broke the tie with a 21-yard FG before the half. The Eagles could not generate offence in the 2nd half and the Fish pulled away.

The Wolverines got the better of a 35-point 2nd quarter with Matt Moore throwing 3 TD passes to 3 different WRs while Tom Brady connected on two, including a 75-yard bomb to Kelvin Benjamin. York tied it up on its first series of the 3rd quarter then took the lead after a 40-yard Brandon Flowers INT return set up Benjamin's 2nd TD catch of the game. Toronto's final push failed on at the York 28.

The Mustangs controlled the 1st quarter and the Spartans controlled the 2nd to finish the 1st half deadlocked at 7. The teams traded TDs to start the 3rd then Aurora WR Albert Wilson sprinted around the end for a 43-yard run to set up a Mike Tolbert dive for the goahead TD. The Spartans misfired on 4th & 3 at the Aurora 34 leading to an Aurora FG. Aurora held Pickering to a FG in the 4th for the win.

The Wrecking Balls dominated defensively in the 1st half but were forced to settle for 3 FGs on 3 trips to the Glads' red zone for a 9-0 lead. The Glads battled back in the 3rd, scoring 17 points, including a 58-yard short slant to Jarvis Landry for a TD. NJ took an 18-17 lead with 3:46 left on an Isaiah Crowell 1-yard TD run, but Blaine Gabbert led a last-ditch drive and Cairo Santos won it on a 39-yard FG.

A 15-yard sack of Carson Palmer at his 3-yard line set up field position for the game's 1st score: a 53-yard Justin Tucker FG. The Cubs added a TD on a Joe Mixon 21-yard run then Tavon Austin's 52-yard catch-and-run set up a Russell Wilson sneak for another as the Cubs led 17-0 at half time. Charles Clay scored for TC on a 36-yard screen but the offence could go no further against a strong Cubs' D.

This contest was not as competitive as the score suggests. Budapest jumped out to a 20-0 lead on a pair of Kai Forbath FGs and a couple of TD runs by David Johnson, the first set up by a Lavonte David pick of Kirk Cousins inside the Regs' red zone. Jeremy Kerley got the Regs on the board with a 5-yard TD catch but Johnson added a 3rd TD run to make it 27-7 at halftime. The Regs never recovered.



NEW YORK – So **Oprah Winfrey** is planning to run for President in 2020! Why not? **Donald Trump** ran for President. **Ronald Reagan** ran for President. There are no technical job qualifications for President that I am aware of, apart from being a citizen of the United States; being at least 35 years of age; and having been a resident here for at least 14 years. That's it! Not a literacy test, or a psychological exam, or even a criminal record check. Almost anybody can become President... *if* 'The People' choose. Nice idea in theory, but of course impossible in reality.

Oprah denies she plans to run, but I know better. My good friend and colleague, LA Knights correspondent **Gabrielle Laurent-Vainluven**, contacted me from Beverly Hills immediately after the Golden Globe Awards.

"Spats! Exciting news! Oprah is going to be our President!" she blurted out breathlessly.

I only reveal what I have about our conversation because she is already on the record in the *LA Daily News* as being in full support of President Oprah and even suggested, in writing, that a "DNC Acclamation" (don't know where she got that term from) would be appropriate to avoid "divisive infighting" in the Democratic Party. The bottom line is that she wanted me to use my journalistic forum to support '*Oprah in 2020*.'

I will, of course, do no such thing. In fact, I think Oprah as President would not only ruin her brand but would put more stress on the social fabric of the country. It's not that his voters do not care about social justice; it's that the people who lost their jobs to China and Thailand to support corporate parasites had had enough.

Anyway, while I am not ready to support Oprah in 2020, I don't think another round of Trump is the answer either based on what I've seen so far. It's time for a third party – one that actually listens to its electors. Somebody should organize it.

THEY TOO SPOKE

The Triumph Mantra – which must be memorized by the players and recited on coach's demand – includes "triumph" over many things. Those things include, among others: enemies; fear; evil; demons; laziness; disrespect; fast food; ego; and racism. But the most important one of all – stressed at all times – is *Adversity*. Triumphing over adversity is 'The Triumph Way.'

The truth is that, in the first five years of their existence, the Triumph never faced true adversity. They faced challenges – the kind that every expansion team faces – but as a natural process of building a team from scratch, as opposed to *re*-building, adversity would not be the best word to describe it.

As it happened, the Triumph always exceeded expectations anyway. They even competed with *Jay Cutler* at quarterback – a triumph in its own right. In 2016, they vastly exceeded their own expectations (although **Guy Williams** won't admit that publicly) by completing a perfect season – the second in EFL history and just the third in professional football history. There would be no improving on that in 2017. But a return to the big game and successful defence of their 2016 Championship seemed well within their reach at the start of the season.

Things have not worked out well for the Triumph this year. They have been hobbled by injuries, and poor play while facing intense competition from riled up teams eager to bump them off. All of it is happening under the harsh spotlight of a rabid media looking for any "inside" story as to why they are slumping. The team is now facing "adversity" in the classic football sense of the term – a crisis of confidence that has the players and coaching staff second-guessing themselves. And now they are in danger of missing the playoffs entirely after dropping a 26-7 decision this week to the Cubs at Joe Ferguson Stadium.

The Cubs came into this contest without having to game plan for a running threat. *Orleans Darkwa*, a grocery-bagger who played some football at Tulane, was signed for one week to start at running back in place of injured *Melvin Gordon* and *Doug Martin*. The Cubs also did not have to game plan for *Antonio Brown*, who was also injured. To picture the home team losing under these circumstances required a vivid imagination indeed.

But, in a season such as this one, nobody on the Cubs' sideline was taking anything for granted. They went at the Triumph with a few slight wrinkles to their typical straight-up defensive game plan. They ran a season-high 5 blitzes and doubled pairs of receivers at a time, creating significant mismatches on 3rd down and long that Carson Palmer could not solve.

While the Triumph offence bucked in futility against the Cubs' defence, the Cubs' offence gradually built up a lead on the long leg of *Justin Tucker*, big runs by *Jerick McKinnon* and *Joe Mixon*, and some nice "chunk" plays in the passing game, including a 52-yard catch-and-run by *Tavon Austin*.

Guy Williams, who has actively sought therapy after a post-game meltdown in Week Seven, visibly struggled to handle his emotions on the sideline. Pacing back-and-forth and muttering to himself as his team fell further behind, the signs that Coach Guy was under inordinate stress were obvious to all. But a forced, toothy smile, comparable to that of a hyena, kept concerned staff

who dared to approach him at bay.

By the 4th quarter, with the Cubs leading 23-7 and the only sign of life for the Triumph to that point an unlikely-to-be-repeated 36-yard screen for a TD to *Charles Clay*, the outlook was grim for Twin Cities: They had the ball at their 18-yard line with 11:36 left.

On a normal day, the situation would have called for *Antonio Brown*, but their hero was not available. So, in place of the 2016 MVP, wide receiver *Rishard Matthews* was called on to save the day. Palmer faded back to pass and looked deep for Matthews, who was nowhere to be seen amongst the cloud of Cubs DBs in deep zone. Taking more time than he could afford, Palmer felt the pocket collapsing around him and chucked the ball toward Clay, who dropped it after a nasty hit by *Alec Ogletree*. Palmer would have been sacked, but *Russell Okung* had put *Fletcher Cox* in a headlock on the play, a breach of the rules that did not escape the notice of the referee. A holding penalty put the Triumph back on their 9, facing 1st & 19.

At that point in the game, video footage shows Williams making a repeated violent kicking motion with his right leg. He was grumbling something under his breath that was captured by a parabolic mike. "Kick-m-indbllz! Kick-m-indbllz!" he chanted, his leg thrusting forward with the word "kick."

Davy Seal, offensive coordinator, was nearest to him. "Say what, Boss?" he asked.

"Kick-m-indbllz! Kick-m-indbllz!" Williams hissed more emphatically.

Seal, a good soldier in the Triumph mold, did not question further. "Chris!" he barked, motioning toward punter Chris Jones. "Punt the ball!"

Jones, being a lowly punter – the one position Coach Williams held in disdain as a necessary evil – did not dare question Guy's faithful lieutenant, Coach Seal. He hastily donned his helmet and jogged on to the field. The special teams unit followed. Only wide receiver *Kenny Golladay*, empowered by a full week of the coaching staff pumping up his ego in the hope that he would turn into *Antonio Brown* for one week, voiced anything close to disapproval.

"Say what?" he shouted as his teammates on the offensive unit jogged off the field. "You shitting me?"

The Cubs were caught off guard as well. The regular defensive unit stayed on the field, with *Tyler Lockett* taking the place of safety *Malcolm Jenkins* in case the laughably obvious "fake punt" turned into an actual kick. In the confusion Okung jumped early, putting the ball half way to the goal line, at the 4. On the next try, Jones actually punted. A surprised Lockett called for a fair catch at the Cubs' 42-yard line. The crowd at Joe Ferguson Stadium also reacted with confusion. Many assumed they had somehow missed some action. Some laughed. A few booed, but whether those were Triumph fans or drunken Cubs' fans who resented being deprived of a safety opportunity was not clear.

While the Cubs went back to work on offence, Williams continued his bizarre ritual dance on the sideline. "Kick-m-indbllz!" he

grumbled with each thrust of his right leg. He was still going at it when the Triumph regained possession and, loyal as the day is long, **Davy Seal** again sent out the punting unit on first down. By now the Iowa crowd was catching on that something was not right. The boos became more plentiful, peppered by shouts and jeers. The Cubs drove without much gusto to a third *Justin Tucker* field goal to make the score 26-7.

As the Cubs lined up to kick off, Triumph Defensive Coordinator, **Jack Lumber**, alarmed that his defence was getting overworked unnecessarily, approached Seal and Coach Williams and asked, with pronounced exasperation in his voice, what the H*!l was going on.

"Coach says to kick the ball," Seal said feistily, sensing a confrontation was brewing. "We kick the ball!"

"It looks like 'coach' has lost his marbles!" Lumber growled defiantly. "Run some plays, god damn it, so my guys can get some rest!"

Seal turned to his coach for direction.

"Kick-m-indbblz! Kick-m-indbllz!" Williams continued, while pacing in a semi-circle jabbing his right leg up at regular intervals. If he heard Seal at all he gave no indication. He wasn't even looking at him, his eyes instead fixed in front of him on nothing in particular.

Reluctantly, Seal turned to *Carson Palmer* and shouted, "Blue-Left-20-Drive then go East Coast wide eye! Got it?" Palmer looked confused. "Just do it!" Seal snapped.

The Triumph ran three running plays with the enthusiasm of a kid eating broccoli and promptly punted on 4th & 4.

The Cubs got the ball back and nearly ran out the clock. But on 4th & 2, with 0:39 left, *Bryan Anger* jogged on to the field to punt the ball away for what everyone assumed would be the final time. The Triumph let the punt roll until it died on their 1-yard line with just 0:07 left. Seal turned one last time to Williams see if his coach had any instruction.

"KICK-M-INDBLLZ! KICK-M-INDBLLZ!" The pitch and volume had risen along with the tempo. Coach Williams' eyes were as wide and deep as bone china tea cups. Flecks of foam appeared at the corners of his mouth.

"You heard him!" Seal turned to the punter Jones, who shrugged his shoulders and strode on to the field to make a punt from the very back of his end zone.

For some reason, *Tyler Lockett* elected to attempt a return but was swarmed under for a loss by a frustrated and angry Triumph special teams unit. They were getting a workout for no apparent reason and Lockett had challenged them in a game that had been decided long ago. Reserve linebacker *Stephone Anthony* was slow to get off of the Cubs' punt returner and said something that the referee appeared to hear but ignore. The time on the game clock read 0:02.

Now it was Coach Redding's turn. While all this theatre had been playing out in front of him he had been stewing on the sidelines. It was one thing for an opponent to gracefully bow out of the competition by running stock plays or having his back-ups put in some work in a blowout. That happened frequently. But punting on 1st down came across as a big 'F-U.' It felt unsportsmanlike and, in a curious way, deprived the Cubs of full battle honours. Their opponent had not fought to the end, but instead mocked the contest.

As **Russell Wilson** prepared to walk on the field to lead the so-called 'victory formation' Redding called him back. "Punt it down their darn throats!" Redding, his voice cracking slightly, ordered his punter. Even in fury, the straight-laced Redding could not bring himself to utter the word "damn" or summon up a stern baritone.

Anger took to the field and dutifully punted the ball through the end zone. The gun sounded, masked by the loud cheers and jeers of the disconcerted Iowa City crowd. The game was officially and mercifully over.

The teams immediately took to the center of the field to shake hands and exchange pleasantries. His anger dissipated somewhat after "getting it off his chest" with that last punt, Coach Redding sought out his counterpart to make peace. But **Guy Williams** was unable to reciprocate. **Jack Lumber** and a team of trainers guided Williams off the field as fast as they could manage with him kicking out violently the entire way. They brought him inside the training room where he spent over a half hour before reemerging, looking marginally normal but very tired.

A crowded press gallery peppered **Guy Williams** with questions after the game. Bleary-eyed and possibly drugged, the hard-pressed Triumph coach did his best to answer the main question about his decision to punt on 1st down in a game that, theoretically at least, was far from over at the time. Citing protection of his three quarterbacks as the main reason (Palmer had been hit hard in the game; *Jay Cutler* had the "flu", and *Mitch Trubisky* was apparently not ready, even for garbage time) he likened his decision to something that Yankees manager **Billy Martin**, a maverick in baseball, might have done in the same situation. When asked to clarify, Williams dissembled in a way that had reporters from across the Continent scratching their heads:

"Those last plays were a transcendental experience for me," he pronounced, not a hint of irony visible on his face. "I had an epiphany. I no longer hated my opponent for throttling my team in a hostile environment. I recognized their right to compete and win!" he continued, flashing that hyena smile. "Competition is not a matter of good versus evil. It simply is! Exhausted and bruised and beaten down by fate I felt we were disappearing. So, I affirmed our existence and resolutely continued to move forward to the next plane of competitive existence. I chose our ending! A far cry from the humiliation and victimized destruction we are used to seeing. Hence, through choice, there is no destruction, only transcendence. If one does as one is enough times, then one will become as is."

While the mainstream sports media endeavours to dissect and interpret this post-game epiphany, let me cut through the bullshit for you and explain what really happened.

Guy Williams, a great coach, faithful husband, loving dad and true patriot, is also one brutally competitive son-of-a-bitch in the mold of his great, great grandfather, WWI ace fighter pilot Captain William "Wee Willie" Williams. I need not retell what I have already revealed in these pages about Guy's infamous ancestor; regular readers will recall his exploits. But it so happens that the irrepressible WWI hero has resurfaced recently in the mainstream media and it is, apparently, a source of renewed pride for the Triumph coach, who has recently displayed a new book on his office coffee table:

'They Too Spoke – Comedy and Tragedy in the Trenches of the Great War' is a book that is gaining attention on the New York Times bestseller list. It is a compilation of letters, diary entries, news stories and anecdotes about life in the trenches during WWI. Edited by **J. Irwin Rudolph**, great, great grandson of Squadron Major **Walter F. J. Q. Rudolph** of the 'Devil's Own Squadron,' it contains a section dedicated to the Air Service of the American Expeditionary Force (AEF). In that section, a familiar character appears without fanfare in the quoted memoirs of one Captain **Benjamin D. May**, of the 19th Aero Squadron. I quote (bold & italics added):

'On May 24th our squadron adjutant, Lieutenant Bolt, had the good fortune to meet in Meurthe-et-Moselle the two Harris sisters of the good old U.S.A., who were at the front giving entertainments to our soldiers in France under the auspices of the Red Cross organization. Lt. Bolt immediately called upon the young ladies to come out to Villey-Sainte-Étienne to give us a performance at our aerodrome. They kindly agreed to come the very next afternoon. Upon receipt of the news, word spread to the squadrons that were billeted close to the hangar of the 19th. Captain 'Wee Willie' Williams of the Signal Corps, a man of small stature and mighty temper declared his intentions to all the airmen present prior to the arrival of the sisters. He proclaimed that he would bed both sisters before twelve bells and would broke no challenge. This raised the ire of our officer corps of the 19th Squadron, since we were the sponsors of the entertainments. Captain Theodore "Bucky" Buchanan likened 'Wee Willie' to the Hun, due to his proclivity to defile women of honour, and did send forth a challenge in defence of the honour of the Harris sisters. Captain Buchanan was a man of stature, over six feet tall and brawny due to his upbringing on a farm in Nebraska. It was agreed that he would pose a formidable obstacle to the dishonourable intentions of Captain Williams. On May 25th the Misses Harris arrived in the afternoon and all the officers and men were impatiently awaiting them. Captain Williams took a place near the front of the stage with two NCOs of the Signal Corps and openly consumed spirits from a flask while addressing those nearby in an ill-tempered manner. Captain Buchanan approached Captain Williams and, out of respect for his heroic deeds on the Western Front against Fritz [Germans], requested with all manner of politeness that he withdraw from his location and renounce his intentions toward the sisters. Captain Williams responded with a swift kick to Captain Buchanan's groin that caused him to bow forward in distress. He repeated this action several times until one Lieutenant Charles intervened with medical officers to retrieve the insensate frame of Captain Buchanan from the pile. Captain Williams remained where he had situated himself and sang raucous songs until the start of the show. The Harris sisters provided a wonderful entertainment for all of us. I remained in the vicinity of Captain Williams and overheard him telling his fellows that if they thought they were going to lose a fight to "kick him in the balls again and again." I was perturbed that a Captain would speak in such a familiar manner to an NCO, but the front caused many to forget the ways of discipline and civil society. Captain Williams abruptly excused himself following the conclusion of the show and disappeared behind the stage. I imagine he had his way with the two Harris sisters as nobody was ready to oppose him that night."

Although the spirit of "Wee Willie" does not usually emerge from inside the Triumph coach without the assistance of a stiff shot of *Maker's Mark*, it appears that on this occasion it did. Or, at least it struggled mightily to emerge under the stress of another futile performance by the Triumph. Knowing he was about to lose, and hating to lose with every fibre of his being, the spirit of Captain **William "Wee Willie" Williams**, buried deep within Guy's DNA, reacted in the only way it knew – to kick his adversary in the balls. Fortunately, enough of Coach **Guy Williams** remained in control of his body that the result was merely a kicking of the ball. As embarrassing and as difficult to justify as that turned out to be, it was preferable to the fate that had befallen Captain Buchanan.

Unfortunately, the Triumph remain in dire straits. They will be hard-pressed to turn things around. The team is not just losing on the football field – they are losing the battle with adversity, starting with their coach.

AROUND THE EFL

Week Twelve was a vast improvement over recent football offerings during the holidays. There were a few really exciting games and a couple that were not, but that nevertheless carried interesting implications for the quickening playoff race. However, it appeared that a few quarterbacks were still digesting turkey leftovers on Sunday as their dulled senses doomed their teams in the end:

At Round Table Stadium in LA, the 'complete' *Andy Dalton* was on display, in all of his majesty, modesty and, sadly in the end for Knights fans; misery. After a modest start, the "Red Rifle" started knocking down targets in the 2nd quarter, throwing for over 200 yards and a pair of touchdowns to build up a 28-20 half time lead over the Patriots. The half ended on a truly majestic note for the home team, with Dalton connecting on a bomb to *Jordan Matthews* for a 47-yard score with no time left on the clock. Round Table rocked in jubilation – it was a rare day when a Knights QB struck so dramatically through the air. But the Dalton Spectacle was far from over. On the Knights' second possession of the third, Charleswood corner *Marcus Cooper* stepped in front of a slightly underthrown ball intended for *Brandin Cooks* and picked it clean. With an open field in front of him Cooper dodged a couple of

tackles and sprinted 58 yards to the Knights' end zone for a score. It was the turning point of the game. Cooper picked Dalton off again on the next series; and although that turnover eventually amounted to nothing on the scoreboard, it frayed the red head's nerves and set the table for a miserable finish. Dalton went on to throw three more interceptions, making a total of five on the day, while the Patriots' running game sprung to life, with unlikely contributions from *Jalen Richard* (78-yard TD run) and *Alvin Kamara* (28-yard TD run), to completely turn the tables on the Knights in a 27-point second half. The final score: Patriots 47, Knights 35. Suddenly, Charleswood is back in the hunt for a wildcard spot while LA is checked, in humbling fashion, in its challenge to Iowa for the West Division.

At Tillman Field in Cowtown, a future Hall-of-Famer endured a similar crash landing after flying high for part of a game. Durham's *Drew Brees* brushed aside a first-series interception to connect on a 91-yard bomb to his favourite target, *TY Hilton* on the first play of their second possession, giving his team an early 7-0 lead. The big play – impressive enough to be a highlight reel staple for the remainder of the season, I predict – pumped up Brees a little too much. With memories of his 73-TD season of glory replaying inside his head, an over-inflated Brees felt empowered to take more chances. You see, the downside of having experienced the high of a record-setting season is that one longs to experience those highs again. And, like an addict, one will go to extraordinary lengths to renew the feeling. Sensing that his quarterback had "that look" in his eye, Coach George Kaldis reined him in for a series, electing to run with *Carlos Hyde* for most of a 2nd quarter field goal drive that made it 17-0 for Durham. But the Lizards had to pass eventually. And when Brees finally got the call to find TY down the seam he whizzed the ball with force into a tight window, only to get picked off by safety Rodney McLeod at the Durham 27. The Corn Kings' offence under Joe Flacco had looked wobbly to that point, with 'Old Joe" (he is looking old these days) having already thrown two interceptions with no TDs to his credit. But as often happens when a turnover abruptly changes the momentum, a shot of adrenaline in the right measure can turn fortunes around. On the next play, Flacco did not hesitate and his aim was true as he hit Mike Evans in stride down the seam (the same play the Lizards had just run that resulted in the interception) for a 27-yard TD pass. The Corn Kings were back in it. The second half played out like a horror show for Durham. Jimmy Garoppolo started the 3rd quarter and drew Cowtown closer with a 47-yard TD pass to Larry Fitzgerald before he was knocked out of the game. A completely new Joe Flacco returned under center for Cowtown. He converted back-to-back third downs on his next series and finished off a 70-yard drive with his second TD pass of the day to Evans to give Cowtown its first lead of the game, 21-20. The Lizards regained the lead on a Hyde dive to make it 27-21, but a relentless Flacco drove his team back up the field 70 yards again to set up a 10-yard TD run by LeGarrette Blount to make it 28-27. The game was shaping up to be a classic, if unexpected, quarterback duel. But with the suddenness of a mudslide the Lizards collapsed in a span of just 21 seconds as their quarterback threw back-to-back interceptions – one of those a pick-six and the other one setting up Blount's second TD – to make the score a laughable 42-27. There would be no Hilton Heroics this week. The Corn Kings stuck to him like glue for the remainder of the game while the rest of the receiving corps showed just how unlike **TY Hilton** they all are. Durham fans better hope that Hilton is able to stay healthy for the stretch run – Brees is not the uplifting force he once was and the rest of the team is riding TY's coattails.

Talk of 'The Curse' is back on in the Media after the Swordfish victimized the Blue Eagles 20-7 at the Fish Tank. If the Swordfish had not sold out to stop the run on a Scarborough 1st and 20 at the Sebastian 43, this would certainly have been another shutout of the lifeless Aaron Rodgers-led Scarborough offence. With extra pass blockers for protection and 10 of the 11 Sebastian defenders seeking to bury the not-normally dangerous TJ Yeldon, Pierre Garcon caught Tramaine Brock flat-footed and got as wide open as a wide receiver is likely to ever get for an easy 43-yard TD pass that, at the time, tied the game. That is the kind of set-up necessary for Rodgers to achieve any success these days. The Fish did not repeat their mistake and Rodgers did not make another play until it was too late. Sebastian went on to ignore the formidable Blue Eagle secondary and ride the legs of D'Onta Foreman and Wendell Smallwood for 201 yards on the ground and 37 minutes of possession, something that never would have happened if the Blue Eagles had not deployed their nickel package for almost the entire game. Although I have reason to believe there may be something real behind 'The Curse,' there was nothing supernatural about the pig-headedness and stupidity of the Scarborough defensive game plan on this day. The grumblings in Scarborough are getting louder and even the fawning MSM is becoming critical. Watch this column for a full analysis of the strange Blue Eagles' season coming up next week.

At Optimist Field in Brooklin, the visiting Bombers put to rest any doubt that they are the team to beat in the East Division by taking out the Hawks 24-17. In the process they also made a case for being the no.1 prospect in the Pacific Conference (although the Cubs will have something to say about that). Bruxelles went into the Hawks' house and trashed it with back-up *Nick Foles* leading the way. It did not start well for the man wearing *Marcus Mariota*'s shoes for a day. He was unable to get much going in a first half that saw the Hawks leading 17-3 by the end of it. But when *Tashaun Gipson* pounced on a *Ryan Mathews* fumble mid-way through the 3rd quarter, Foles jumped to life. He threw two TD passes, both long shots to *Terrelle Pryor Sr.*, and ran for another to blow up Brooklin's hopes of a Division title. While Bruxelles has not clinched the division, it would take a serious collapse at this point to give it up.

The idea that the Hellfire could make a serious run at a playoff spot became more reality than fantasy this week as they overcame another injury to *Andrew Luck*, as well as two turnovers, to outscore the Chargers 21-18 at The Fiery Depths and rise to 7-5. Back-up *Connor Cook* was not good, but he did not need to be. *Jay Ajayi* scored on a 59-yard TD run and *Tevin Coleman* broke loose for a 67-yard TD run and added a TD catch on a 9-yard check down to account for all the scoring Mohave would require. The Mohave run game compiled 258 yards and the defence sacked *Carson Wentz* 8 times in an overall team performance that had those few fans left in Mohave who care about the team staying chanting, 'HELL NO, WE WON'T GO!'

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

LOS ANGELES @ CHINO (line – KNIGHTS by 2)

The Andy Dalton 4th quarter meltdown last week against the Pats was frightening to behold for Knights fans who harbour hopes of a deep post-season run. The 'Red Rifle' has a history of forgetting to adjust his sights from time-to-time, but five interceptions are a lot even for him. Perhaps more worrying is the fact that the 'Blue Shield' was gashed for 228 yards on the ground – a traditional area of strength. With their quarterback a turnover risk and their defence showing cracks; teams that are hanging around, like Chino, could not ask for a better time to knock the Knights off of their playoff steed and force them to fight it out in the mud. At home and licking their wounds after coming up 7 yards and 7 points short against Virden, the Convicts can draw even and secure the critical tie-breaker over LA with a win here. A loss and they remain alive, but trailing with a pack of longshots. Both teams are relatively healthy but likely missing their top edge rushers on the line – Michael Bennett for LA and rookie, Takkarist McKinley for Chino. This is good news for the passing games on both sides. When these teams met in Week One a banal offensive game plan by the

Knights was handled well by the 'Lockdown Crew.' Despite getting burned while playing with fire last week, expect LA to be very active through the air against a so-so Chino cornerback corps. **PICK: LOS ANGELES**

In an inter-division battle for a wildcard spot it doesn't get much more critical than this. The Corn Kings can gain an extra game and secure the tie-breaker against one of their two main rivals with a win. But a loss will even their records and hand the Spartans the tie-breaker. These teams typically play each other close but the Kings enjoy a 3-game winning streak against the Spartans and carry momentum into this game, having rallied late against Durham last week. The Spartans have been a volatile 6-6 – difficult to predict and, often as not, difficult to watch. But this is a game that should probably go in their favour, despite being Vegas underdogs, due to advantageous key match-ups and injuries to depth of the Cowtown secondary and interior offensive line. There are, of course, roads to victory for the visitors, but most are windy and dependent on Joe Flacco's driving skills to stay out of the ditch. Much will depend on who gets the early upper hand. Neither team wants their pick-prone QBs to have to pass from behind. **PICK: PICKERING**

The Hellfire have won six of their last seven and are shattering the conventions of the modern era by building a winner from the ground up. Jay Ajayi and Tevin Coleman have carried a heavy load during their winning run, providing opportunities in the passing game that were not available early in the season, but fatigue will soon become a factor. Here they face another run-first team with a fragile passing game to protect. Derek Carr has the arm, but his target selection is slim after Amari Cooper and Eric Ebron; and Ebron is out. These teams look evenly matched until one considers the possibility that Andrew Luck will not dress for the game. Back-up Connor Cook has seen too much action already and most of it has not been pretty. If Cook starts, the Hellfire will look to its defence to position them for victory; something they haven't done since the Seattle game – and that doesn't count. The Violators – winners of 3 in a row – can clinch the division with a win here and a Twin Cities loss. Expect them to do their part. **PICK: VIRDEN**

A game that would have been seen at the start of the season as a possible Conference Final preview is, in Week Thirteen, a battle for survival for both teams. While the Hawks are not in dire playoff peril here, if they lose they can likely kiss the East Division title goodbye and expect to be in a dog fight for a wildcard spot. The Triumph can stay alive in the Central Division hunt with a win, but a loss could eliminate them while crippling their wildcard hopes. The Triumph are 4-1 at home and feed off a loyal fanbase that has been surprisingly patient while riding a turbulent emotional roller coaster in 2017. Some are expecting a fan backlash over the three 1st down punts in the 4th quarter of last week's open-and-shut loss to the Cubs. But if love is still in the air at Wilhalla Stadium, expect the Triumph to take advantage of some key Hawks injuries to limit their opponent's options on both sides of the ball. Also expect a much more balanced and effective attack with Melvin Gordon and Antonio Brown healthy again. **PICK: TWIN CITIES**

One of these teams will be all but mathematically eliminated from the playoff race with a loss. I say "all but" because, believe it or not, 8-8 could still win a spot in the post-season if all the right stars are aligned correctly by the end of Week 16. But the Chargers might not wish to prolong the agony after falling to Connor Cook and the Hellfire last week and generally stinking it up on offence over the past four weeks. The Pat's 'D' is not in the giving mood these days – just ask Andy Dalton about it – and a successful relief appearance by Blake Bortles last week might auger a welcome change in leadership down the stretch for the Pats' offence. Dalvin Cook will be missed in the Chargers' offensive scheme if he cannot play, as will top CB Adoree' Jackson – listed as 'questionable' –

be missed in both the Chargers' secondary and special teams. It's not looking good for the visitors. PICK: CHARLESWOOD

The North Stars can clinch the Coastal Division with a win or a Pickering loss to Cowtown. The Fish cannot be eliminated this week, but a win could allow them to leap frog over as many as three of their fellow wildcard trailers and improve their position down the stretch. The injury to Orlando Scandrick could be influential in this game, as the North Stars have no man-to-man answer at corner for Doug Baldwin, one of Sebastian's two principal offensive weapons. The twin edge threat of Calais Campbell and Cameron Jordan could end up being pivotal in frustrating Sebastian's downfield passing game. On the other side, Brian Hoyer looked comfortable against the Regs last week, but he had a lot of help from David Johnson. The Swordfish run defence is stout so the passing game will have to click if Budapest hopes to cover. This will likely be a Stars' win, but expect it to be a nail-biter. **PICK: SEBASTIAN**

What the past two weeks have shown is that no lead is safe, for either team, when Durham is involved. After storming back to an improbable victory over the Pats in Week Eleven, the Lizards squandered a 17-point lead to fall to the Corn Kings last week. Interceptions, both for and against, played a central role in these 60-minute dramas, as did long touchdown passes. While Durham is the most exciting team to watch these days, they are also the most unpredictable. Drew Brees' 18 interceptions are cited as a factor in rising pepto bismol sales in Durham Region and profit losses in some Vegas bookmaking firms. The Durham game plan consists of Brees-to-Hilton target practice with 20-odd Carlos Hyde runs thrown in as breathers. This makes the top CB of Durham's opponent the focus of much pre-game attention. William Gay is in the spotlight this week as is pick-off artist Kurt Coleman. The rest is a sideshow. Yes, Tom Brady is out there too. But if Kelvin Benjamin goes back to sleep again, it will not matter. **PICK: DURHAM**

Erieau bought another week on playoff death row by grinding down the woeful Pilots last week. The defence would probably tell you it was not satisfied with its performance in holding the worst offence in the league to 13 points; but the offence can put a feather in its cap for springing free Jordy Nelson for 140 yards and big touchdown catch against a respectable Seattle defence. So, the Caddies still have a drop of fuel in the tank and the Bombers have a division to clinch, making this game technically meaningful. But we all know that, with Marcus Mariota back, the real question is not who will win, but whether or not Erieau can crack the double-digit spread. For that to happen, the pass rush will have to go "week one" on the Bruxelles o-line. But Mariota is no Carson Palmer – if somehow Joey Bosa gets around Joe Thomas, he still has to catch the elusive Hawaiian. Good luck! Eliminating the Cadillac from the playoffs is a mere formality at this point. Expect it to happen here, in somewhat emphatic style. **PICK: BRUXELLES**

While the Pilots, at 3.8 yards per play, are on track to be the least efficient offence of all time, their performance has picked up enough of late that it is unlikely they will set new lows in total yards or points scored. This week, at home, against a defence they have already shown they can handle, they hope to improve on that average by pulling off a few "chunk plays" against the EFL's most passive defensive scheme. The Cubs play defence straight up and challenge their opponents to beat their personnel. That strategy probably should have worked when these teams faced each other back in Week One, but an unpressured Eli Manning eventually found his receivers for a pair of long TD strikes to make that game uncomfortably close for the Cubbies. Eli is capable of that when he has time and I expect he will get time to throw again this week. Whether he wants to, with top target Phillip Dorsett showing signs of fatigue and ballhawk Casey Hayward covering him like a blanket, is a different story. Probably safer to task Kareem Hunt and Bilal Powell with the job of moving the offence and keeping the ball out of Russell Wilson's hands. **PICK: IOWA CITY**

The Eagles lost two straight with Jordan Howard out of the line-up and scored a measly 7 points total in those two games. Not even their vaunted secondary was able to save the team and Aaron Rodgers from looking and performing like a total train wreck. This week they face a terrifying opponent in the Wrecking Balls – terrifying, because: the NJ defence is playing at a high level at a time when the Scarborough offence is in retrograde; and a loss to the unluckiest/worst team in the league would certainly break the Eagles' frail psyche and cause a riot in the stadium. The return of Howard has to help things, but don't expect him alone to save the Bluebirds. They will need lots of help from their gang of thieves in the secondary, their pass rush and... is it too much to ask Aaron Rodgers to throw a friggin' touchdown? Expecting the cloud over Scarborough to start raining locusts and frogs.... **PICK: NEW JERSEY**

Back-up QB, Matt Moore offers a different look behind center for Toronto – more seasoned, less prone to panic – but there is a reason he is a back-up. He has already been sacked 10 times and picked off 3 in limited action. He also has 4 touchdown passes; a testament to his ability to make plays. He will need to make a lot of them if he hopes to keep up with a Mustangs offence at full sprint. It indeed appears that Aurora is on its way to another perfect regular season. A win here is as locked in as it gets and the remaining challengers are not overly threatening. The Toronto offensive line, not strong at the best of times, is feeling the loss of center Corey Linsley and guard Eric Wood. This will make everything more difficult for Moore and the offence. On the other side, the only thing that stands against Matt Ryan is Jalen Ramsey. Still, the spread is huge in a season of randomness. Expect a few wrinkles. **PICK: TORONTO**

Disappointment abounds around both of these teams as they hobble down the stretch. The Glads are still alive in the wildcard race, despite the generally atrocious play of the offence, but optimism is at a low point with Blaine Gabbert and his 36.1 QB rating slated to start. The Regulators, losers of seven straight, will probably be eliminated from post-season play this week even if they win – a good possibility given the state of the Glads' secondary, with Darius Butler joining the injury list. The tenderness of the Regulator running-back committee is the Achilles Heel of this offence. With teams sitting on the pass, Kirk Cousins is always battling and usually losing. This week he has a good shot at winning if the running game can muster more than 10 carries. **PICK: SOUTH CAROLINA**





FROM THE EFL ARCHIVES – In Week Twelve of the 2011 EFL Season, the league announced the award of two expansion franchises for the 2012 season. Of the eventual four teams that would be incorporated into the league in 2012, the Commonwealth Colonials and the Twin Cities Triumph were the first two franchises to receive their licences. At the time of the announcement the league was only authorized to award two, but the membership was expected to ratify an additional two in the coming weeks. Interestingly, the Colonials, although based in Virginia, are considered by league historians to be the first attempt by the

EFL to establish a presence across the Atlantic. The principal financier of the team was British billionaire, **Richard Branson**. He was said to be planning for a Colonials game to be played in London in the 2013 season.

Week 12 was one of those weeks where the best match-ups were not ones likely to dramatically impact the playoff races. The Blue Eagles (8-4) rebounded from their Week 11 loss to Pickering with a 24-17 comeback win over the Patriots (8-4). For those who can't remember the last time *Aaron Rodgers* won a game for his team, check out his line: 21 of 32, 160 yards and 3 TDs to rally the Eagles in the 2nd half. Neither team moved in the standings

The Spartans (11-1) won 10-9 over the Convicts (5-7) on a 32-yard *Josh Scobee* FG as time expired. Fans were eager to see how Matt Cassel handled the championship grade Chino defence (if only they had a QB!). The win allowed Pickering to stay ahead of a Cowtown (10-2) squad that survived a 17-16 thriller over the Knights (9-3). *Joe Flacco* hit *Santana Moss* for a 48-yard TD pass with 0:20 left and a holding penalty on LA nullified a 103-yard kick return for a TD by *Eric Weems* in the dying seconds. Cowtown led a charmed existence.
